Society's Talks ~ September to November

September saw a visit from David Woodliffe who reminded us of the sacrifice of warfare with his extensive selection of slides of war memorials, mainly, but not exclusively from South Wales. The slides included one of the Newbridge Memorial which was subsequently rebuilt at St Fagans and which we saw on our visit there.

In October we had a return visit from John Evans who told us about the role of the Quakers in alleviating the grinding poverty around Brynmawr and the Eastern Valleys in the 1920s and 1930s. Their activities included the encouragement of small businesses not only in the traditional industries of furniture making and shoemaking but also the establishment of agricultural holdings.

Well known local historian Chris Barber visited in November and we were treated to his presentation on Kilvert Country. It took the form of a slide show with occasional musical accompaniment and a narration taken directly from the reverend gentleman's diaries. It was fascinating to see that the countryside he described is today little changed.

Crickhowell District Archive Society

In August this year Crickhowell District Archive Society (CDAC) celebrated its first ten years with a very successful two-day exhibition, putting on show some of the more interesting documents, maps and photographs from its collections. CDAC was set up in 2000 by a group of senior citizens keen to preserve the documentary evidence of the area's rich history, accessing, through the charity Help the Aged, funds available to celebrate the Millenium. In 2006 it moved from its offices at 6 High Street (opposite Webb's) to its current location on the first floor of the CRiC building.

CDAC serves local historians and genealogists and has a rich collection of printed, digital, map and photographic items relevant to the eight parishes making up the local area: Crickhowell, Llangenny, Patrishow, Llanbedr, Cwmdu, Llangynidr, Llangattock and Llanelly, For all of these we have the tithe maps and parish records. In recent years a series of publications has been produced, including *Llangattock Scrapbook, The Mills of Grwyne*, and *Crickhowell through the Eyes of the Tourist*, the latest being *The Story of Latham House* by Tim and Serena Raikes. A small team of volunteers – we are currently looking to add to their number - ensures that the Centre is open weekdays and Saturdays, 10-12.30. You may not be able to join us as a volunteer but you can support CDAC for just £6 by becoming a Friend, each of whom receives our twice-yearly *Newsletter*.

There is a clear overlap of interests between CDAC and the Crickhowell District History Society there will shortly be a meeting between the committees of both to consider how we might develop an effective collaboration in the future – in the interest of both organisations and the community at large.
