## Walk to the Lost Settlement of Tregaer

The first part was an easy walk along the track which had been the original road into the settlement where we saw the remains of several houses and outbuildings which had formed part of a thriving settlement. We then climbed the steep hillside on a narrow track to see one of the best preserved ruins, it was a difficult trek but the outcome made it very worthwhile.

## Visit to Pontypridd Museum

On Thursday 25 June twelve members journeyed to Pontypridd where we were met by the Museum's curator, Brian Davies, a regular speaker at our meetings. We started with a walk on the Common, in heavy rain which got steadily worse, but this did not curb Brian's enthusiasm as he explained the importance of the standing stones in the town's history. We then moved indoors to the Museum in a converted chapel where we saw many fascinating exhibits in a wonderful setting.

On 17 July, on a gloriously hot evening, ten Society members journeyed to the imposing memorial at the former colliery in Six Bells where on 28 June 1960 twenty eight miners were killed in an underground explosion. Our member, the Rev Margaret Williams, who grew up in Six Bells and whose father worked at the mine gave a personal and moving account of the events surrounding the disaster and its effect on the community, amongst those killed was Margaret's eighteen year old cousin and one of her former classmates.

We then travelled down the valley to Risca Heritage Museum where we were welcomed by our President, Robin Williams, and four of his colleagues who were on hand to describe and highlight the many exhibits in what is considered to be one of the finest heritage museums in South Wales.
