Our Autumn Talks

The ever-popular and informative Chris Barber began our Autumn season with a fascinating talk on the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal. He was followed in October by Geoff Williams with his meticulously-researched history of his home Penheolrhyn. The season was rounded off with Malcolm Meadows' multimedia presentation on World War One at sea and the poignant account of the sinking of the "Lusitania."

Talks for 2018

Our AGM features a talk by Dr Naylor Firth on John Upton, whose prowess as a civil engineer was somewhat overshadowed by his criminal activities. Our programme moves from the first century, with Jeremy Bosanguet on the Romans in the Usk Valley, to the twentieth with Mel Warrender explaining why the steelworks was built in Ebbw Vale. Closer to home, Will Davies, from Cadw, will present his talk on Crickhowell Castle which had to be postponed from this year and Society member, Eric Gower will tell us about the war memorial in St Edmund's church. Three of our regular contributors return, with Brian Davies explaining his role in establishing the Big Pit Mining Museum and our President, Robin Williams, takes us to sunnier climes with a talk about ancient armaments in Malta. Our final talk takes place shortly after the hundredth anniversary of the armistice which ended World War 1 and, appropriately, Malcolm Meadows will be telling us about the role of women in the war

The tour of the town will present no problem for us, but we are a bit stuck on the heraldic question. Can anyone help us out, or advise us where we might seek answers to help the Howell family?
